 buckles which small token of friendship I
 beg him to accept and I give and bequeath
 to Mr. John Ditcher wife of my nephew
 John Ditcher my best pair of silver shoe
 buckles and a pair of silver shoe buckles
 wives to Sarah Ditcher daughter of John
 and Jane Ditcher I give the sum of five
 pounds and the Courtise shall contribute
 made by James Spadford and to James
 Ditcher the sister I give the sum of five
 pounds and the Courtise shall contribute
 my wife's to my nephew John Ditcher

 particularly during my illness I give and
 bequeath the sum of ten pounds and I
