This is the last Will and Testament

of me Willm Muddock of the parish of Saint
Andrews Holborn in the County of Middlesex
first I order and direct that my body be decently
buried at the discretion of my Executors herein
after named and that all my just debts and funeral
expenses be by them paid and satisfied as soon as
convenient to them I give and bequeath unto my
son Samuel Muddock and to my Cousin Thomas
Baker of Cuddingly in the County of Sussex
Clerk the Sum of six hundred pounds Consolidated
Three per Cent Annuities now standing in my name
in the Assets of the Governor and Company of the
Bank of England to hold the same to them the said
Samuel Muddock and Thomas Baker their heirs
Executors and administrators in Trust nevertheless
and to and for the several uses intents and purposes
hereinafter mentioned and declared (that is to say
In Trust for the use and benefit of my six Grand
Children three of whom are my son William Muddock
one my son Samuel Muddock's and two my son John
Muddock's to be equally divided between them my
meaning and desire is each of the said six Grandchildren
may be intitled to and receive one hundred pounds
stock out of the above six hundred as they shall
respectively arrive at the age of eighteen years
and that they be intitled to the Interest thereof
from the first usual payment after my decease and
that my said Trustees above named or the survivor
of them his Executors or administrators do receive
the Interest of the aforesaid six hundred pounds
and expend the same as to them shall seem most
advantageous for the Trust here imposed on them
so that every one of the said Children separately
hath the Interest of one hundred pounds stock
and further my will is that if any said Grandchild
shall happen to die before or the arrive at the age
of eighteen years then the respective share of the
person so dying to become the property of his
or her surviving Brother or Brothers or Sister and
for want of such Brother or Sister to my son Samuel
his heirs or assigns I give and bequeath unto my
son William Muddock the Sum of seven hundred
pounds stock in the Consolidated three per Cent
annuities to be paid or transferred to him his heirs
or assigns within one month after my decease I also
give my said son William my large Silver Cup and
to his son William my watch I give to my son John
Muddock the Sum of eight hundred pounds stock in
the aforesaid three per Cent annuities to be paid
or transferred to him his heirs or assigns within

one month after my decease I give to my son -
 Samuel Arundock the sum of a hundred pounds
 stock in the aforesaid three per cent. annuities to
 be transferred or paid to him his heirs or assigns -
 within one month after my decease I give to my -
 son Arundock the sum one thousand pounds
 stock in the aforesaid three per cent. annuities to
 be transferred to him his heirs or assigns within
 one month after my decease I also give to my said
 son Arundock the lease of my house wherein I now
 dwell with all my stock in Trade Tools and Implements
 thereof and my desire is that he shall have it in
 his power to take my household furniture at a
 fair appraisement or leave it to be disposed of as
 my Executors therein after named shall think proper
 I give to my sister Arary Good the sum of ten pounds
 to be paid within one month after my decease, but if
 she should happen to die before that time then the
 said ten pounds to become the lawful property
 of my aforesaid Cousin Thomas Barber I give to my
 three daughters in Law each the sum of five pounds
 for mourning I give to my sister in Law Sarah Potts
 the sum of five pounds for mourning I give to my
 Cousin Ararth Barber of Butley in the County of
 Suffolk the sum of five pounds to be paid within
 one month after my decease I give to my aforesaid
 Cousin Thomas Barber five pounds I give to my
 Godson William Barber son of the above named -
 Ararth Barber one Guinea and I also give to my
 Cousin Benjamin Downing and Arary his wife -
 now of Ipswich in Suffolk each of them one Guinea
 for a Ring I desire that my wearing Apparel
 Linen and Linnen is as equally divided between
 my four Sons as my Executors conveniently can
 do it and as to all the best residue and remainder
 of my Estate whether Real or Personal of what
 nature or kind soever and wheresoever after the
 above Bequests debts funeral and other expenses
 are fully paid and discharged I give devise and
 bequeath the same to be equally divided between
 my aforesaid Son Samuel Arundock and my aforesaid
 Cousin Thomas Barber as residuary Bequests and
 further I do hereby will and declare that my
 Executors shall not be chargeable with or
 accountable for any more Araries than they shall
 actually receive or shall come into their hands by
 virtue thereof nor shall either of them be
 accountable for any Act or Deed done by the other
 without their joint Consent and I desire also that
 my Executors deduct out of my Estate all Sols Costs
 Damages and Expenses as they or either of them
 shall see put to or sustain for or by reason of the

Execution thereof And Lastly I do hereby nominate
 and appoint the aforesaid Thomas Barber and my
 aforesaid Son Samuel Burdett Executors of this my
 last will and Testament hereby revoking all former
 wills and Codicils by me made declaring this only to
 be my last will and Testament unto which I have
 hereunto set my hand and Seal this fourteenth day
 of July in the year of our Lord one thousand seven
 hundred and eighty six. *Wm. Burdett* - signed sealed
 published and declared by the said Testator as and
 for his last will and Testament in the presence of his
 who in his presence and at his request and in the
 presence of each other have subscribed our names
 as witnesses hereunto Elizabeth Troome James Smith
 The Clerk of Mary James L.

This Will was proved at London the twenty ninth
 day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand
 seven hundred and eighty nine before the reverend

 Cox of Bingley in the County of Yorkshire the sum
 of three hundred pounds 300 £ out of which I have
 committed unto the Interest one thousand at the time
 of my decease and all Dividends that may be due or in
 my possession at the time of my decease and all my
